State Parks in Limbo

As of this writing, we are still waiting to hear the fate of our State Parks in regards to the proposed budget released by the Governor in January. We do know the proposed budget contains an \$11 million cut for State Parks in the coming fiscal year, which will grow to \$22 million in permanent cuts to the Department. We also know this means park closures and additional service reductions, however a park closure list has not been released as of yet. A statewide committee from State Parks was asked to submit their recommendations to the Director's office, which in turn submitted their recommendations to the Governor's office. We can expect that list will go through political scrutiny before it is released to the public.

Obviously, State Parks are not alone in the budget crisis and many other agencies are waiting to see what will happen with the Governor's proposal to put a tax extension measure on the June ballot. What is most concerning is the fact that if these taxes are not extended, the budget will be in much worse trouble and it could mean even greater cuts to State Parks. So, it is not a pretty picture and the solution is to come up with new, creative solutions to keeping our parks operating for the benefit of the people of California.

Park Excellence Project

In 2010, Stewards was asked to participate in a joint undertaking of the California State Parks Foundation and Save the Redwoods League to outline a vision of excellence for State Parks as we move into the 21st century. The project also made recommendations on how best to promote that vision. That Park Excellence Project report has now been released and can be found on the California State Parks Foundation's website (www.calparks.org). The report calls for a community of partners, nonprofit, private, community, and governmental agencies to collaborate around a set of five core strategies.

Make Parks Relevant (*creatively engaging and interacting with park visitors providing high quality hospitality and amenities and visibly showcasing the benefits of park use*)

Increase Access for All (*helping Californians feel comfortable in nature, is easily reachable, growing the next generation of stewards and integrating with other education and recreational programs*)

BIRDING SEMINAR WITH PETER LEVEQUE

Good Morning Ruby,

I wanted to write and thank you so much for the fabulous birding seminar on Saturday. I had gotten notification about the date change on your e-news or e-blast and signed right up. Of course, Peter Leveque is the great draw and he exceeded expectations in every way. Loved the skulls (and frozen, and then partially thawed) bird bodies, which is always fascinating. A bird I have always wanted to see was a Puffin and here was a Horned Puffin from the California coast! Admittedly, it was very dead, but hey, still it may be the closest I ever come to a bird on the wing.

There were two things that Peter said in class which particularly resonated. He has such a great attitude, after being with him for just a few minutes you are swooning! Plus, he is so sensible, (not just about birds) and projects, but he does it effortlessly, and with such warmth and humanity. Even better than the bird tips and various bits of biology wisdom was his over all philosophy. Two examples: First he said, "what happens when you misidentify a bird? Do your binoculars implode and crumble? No!"

And later, on the same theme, he said something along these lines as we were all gazing skyward, the name of the bird is good, but it is not the most important moment of the experience. The delight of being outside, that particular moment with the bird is what is paramount. Even if you never manage to get its correct name.

Saying that, we have lived in Jenner for 10 years and now up at Timber Cove for almost 23 years, and on Saturday I saw a mature (and bonus points for this, an immature one right below that branch) Bald Eagle for the first time on the coast. Thanks to some crack birder who was in the class. That is two Bald eagles! For over thirty years I have been looking up at every Osprey hoping for this. Thrilling.

The warm afterglow of birding with Peter still lingers. I spent hours later that afternoon going through his very informative handouts, and cross referencing them with my bird books and now feel ignited with inspiration.

Thanks again for facilitating such a superb program! And for giving so much joy.

In Memory

Derrick Andrews 1932 – 2011

Heaven is a better place to live for our kind and loving father, Derrick Guy Andrews. After 92 years living on this earth, he joyfully entered heaven on February 21, 2011 during a day trip to Bodega Bay with his daughter, Marilyn. His heart attack occurred while he was shopping at a nursery – very fitting because he loved plants and was involved all his life in nursery/gardening.

Derrick moved to Hollywood with his family from Medicine Hat, Alberta as a young boy – one of 7 children. He graduated from Hollywood High School in 1935 and then worked at a plant nursery. He joined the navy after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, and served in the navy's dental labs in San Diego until the war ended in 1945. From 1943 to 1958, he was married to Charlene and together they had four children. During this time, Derrick began his 33 year career with the California State Parks, first serving at Big Sur. In his tenure, he also spent time at Armstrong Redwoods, Mt. Tamalpais, Samuel P. Taylor and MacKerricher State Beach.

In 1966, Derrick started attending square dancing classes and met his second wife, Betty. The two fell in love and were married in 1967. They served God in a variety of capacities for the next 30 years, until her death in 2005. They both generously gave of their time, leading Good News Clubs in their home, facilitating various Bible studies, volunteering at Mount Gilead Bible Camp, and serving as active members with the Native Plant Society and the Audubon Society. Through the sales of Betty's art work, they were able to support many missionaries throughout the world. Derrick and Betty were deeply committed to each other throughout their entire marriage until Betty passed away.

Following retirement, Derrick used his extensive knowledge and love of nature as a volunteer docent at Armstrong Redwoods State Park. He also loved to study the Bible, pray for his family and friends, take nature walks, work in the garden, eat out, complete jigsaw puzzles and attend summer Bible camps at Mount Hermon Christian Conference Center.

Derrick is survived by his four children: Marilyn, Michael, Bruce, and Barbara; his step-son Richard, seven grandchildren and several great-grandchildren; and brothers Donald and David.

Editors note: Derrick is remembered fondly by many at Stewards as a wonderful interpreter who loved leading school children through the park. He was an active docent at the Armstrong Visitor Center and participated in the Friends of Armstrong Redwoods (FAR) planning group. Even after he was no longer able to docent, he visited us at the park a number of times. We were very pleased to participate in his 90th birthday party in May of 2008 in the Armstrong Group Picnic Area.

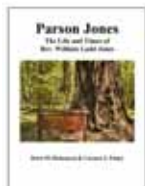

What a fantastic season we have had so far this year. Everything has been abnormal as far as both weather and whale sightings—but we sure have enjoyed it.

Every weekend we have been entertained by our juvenile whales that have been around since last summer. In addition we have seen a few of them still heading south (which they normally do this time of year) to the delight of all our volunteers (both old-timers and newcomers) along with the hundreds, if not thousands of visitors who have been coming to our beautiful coast.

We saw the first whales heading north at Bodega Head on February 19—right on schedule, according to our records going back 18 years. So we are seeing whales every weekend we are out at the Head—not too many and they have been somewhat further out than normal. We are now waiting for the mothers/calves which should be coming in a few more weeks. According to reports from down in the lagoons the number of calves this year is far larger than last year.

Jenner Headlands Hikes

Stewards is very pleased to offer hikes on the new Jenner Headlands acquisition in partnership with the Sonoma Land Trust and the Wildlands Conservancy. Each hike will leave from the Russian Gulch State Park parking area, which is approximately 3.2 miles north of the town of Jenner along Highway 1. Traveling north the parking lot is located on the left side of the road (west). Please plan on arriving at the parking lot promptly at 10am. At this location we will provide a brief presentation about the property, fill out required liability forms, and then organize carpools to drive to the entrance located off of Highway 1.



Jenner Headlands Coastal Hike

Strenuous hike, must be in good physical condition

The hike will take place along the coastal headlands of the property. This strenuous 4.0-mile roundtrip hike will ascend more than 800 feet in elevation. Along the way, hikers will be greeted with dazzling views of the Sonoma Coast (on clear days!). Some sections of the route are especially rough with uneven footing so please wear sturdy hiking boots. This hike is not for inexperienced hikers — you must be in good physical condition. Along with the rough terrain comes the varying coastal weather that can bring bright, sunny skies or damp, cold, foggy and windy weather. We highly recommend dressing in layers and including a windbreaker jacket to protect you from the potentially biting coastal winds.
